## Current Developments at EVRC

We've had a lot going on these past few months.

Listeners of B98 FM may have already heard our new radio spots. B98 has created some terrific commercials for us, which will be running through the end of this year. We really hope this radio promotion will generate some tours and donations for us.

Our big project this quarter has been finishing up the rehab clinic area. New Kansas regulations require a quarantine and treatment area for the injured birds we receive, and we've been working hard to make a first-rate clinic take shape. We've painted the walls and floor, installed cabinets, and are in the process of securing an exam table, lighting, and some shelving. Once it's all put together, it will look really sharp.

We also got a big group of wonderful volunteers together one Saturday to stain the bird and flight pens. The ice storm earlier this year and regular wear-and-tear had taken its toll on the first coats. The new coat of stain makes them really look sharp for programs and tours.

I also spent a week in Minneapolis/St. Paul, training at the Minnesota Raptor Center. It was a terrific experience and I received some great ideas to use here. That week-long course also satisfied a new Fish & Wildlife rehabilitators regulation for continuing education hours.

We've also had a few volunteer project days to repaint the bird pens and de-weed and re-mulch the seating area and flight pen. Other than that, it's been business as usual!

## Adopt-a-Bird

Eagle Valley's largest single expenditure is food – keeping a single bald eagle fed for a month costs \$75! And with the winter months coming up fast, we need to be able to provide rich, high-protein food for our birds, such as quail.

Owls have about 7,000 feathers.


There are over 200 species of owls in the world.
